All are proud, active members of the Academy Immaculate Conception/Marian Heights Academy Alumnae Board of Directors.

And they are fiercely determined to build the connection among their beloved alumnae, and with their beloved Sisters of St. Benedict, stronger than ever.

For they share the bond of spending some very special years together on a very special hill in Ferdinand. And fully realize how it shaped their lives for the better, forever.

Tina Dalton, class of '82, said, "I might not be running a Fortune 500 company or singing on Broadway, but I am a successful person because the sisters taught us to be humane. I'm also able to stand up for myself because the Academy made me realize I have a voice.

"I always feel a connection to the sisters.

Talk about some smart women and fantastic surrogate moms. They took care of us when we could be at our worst, and from all indications they actually loved doing it. I will always be grateful to them. I love reading their website and newsletters."

Sarah Tucker, class of '81, cannot imagine what her life would have been like without a relationship with the sisters.

"I arrived in Ferdinand when I was 14," she said. "It was then, and continues to be, the greatest gift my parents could have ever given me. I learned so much more than the subjects I studied. I learned about myself, about love and faith, how to live with peers who were different ethnically and culturally, and about a balance that allows me to be – mostly! – grounded."

Connie Egloff, class of 1973, is passionate about alumnae growing stronger ties among themselves and with the sisters.

"I feel the urgency in protecting our relationships and reaching out to those alumnae across the generations and all over the world to maintain a group of closely connected women," she said.

"We need to be those voices for each other to lift each other up when needed, and rejoice and celebrate with each other's life's joys.

"Facebook has made a huge connection. I applaud those women who are the movers and shakers in this social medium. When I go to the site, I feel a strong connection with those I've never met. It's good to share our lives this way.

"I would love to find ways to bring more alumnae back each year for Alumnae Day. I'm getting older, and conversations with those who are always in my heart are becoming priorities for me. I want to learn more about each alum while there is time." As for the sisters, Egloff totally believes in their mission of helping those less fortunate, saying they are a "forward-thinking group of women with endless energy." Plus, she absolutely loves the "delicious" monastery cookies.

Ruth Metzger, class of '72, said, "What a treasure our education at the Academy was, and the Benedictine way of life that continues to influence the way we live our lives. The sisters are an important influence in the Catholic Church.

"Now that I teach at a university and see the students who come to us that can't do simple math or write a coherent one-page paper, let alone think critically, I am even more grateful for my education."

Sandy Troth, class of 1963, is typical of others who say serving on the alumnae board has been a "wonderful experience." It has broadened her vision, and has been rewarding for her to get to know other alumnae on a personal basis.

Ann Nagy, class of '72, feels "blessed to have had the influence of the sisters in my life."

She's a music teacher and a choir director and organist. "I realize daily the profound impact the sisters had on me during those formative years. Their influence lives on in the lives of my students through my teaching, which is largely modeled after the wonderful teachers I had at the Academy. The sisters have been life-long supports for me, and I enjoy going back to visit."

Mary Jane Nunning, class of 1958, has a growing appreciation for what the sisters gave her during her high school years – the instilling of good morals, and the value of work, prayer, and music, which has made her "who I am today."

"Now I want to give back to them. As a board member, I became more aware of the needs of the retired sisters who provided so much guidance during my developing years. We must preserve what we have and contribute as we can to continue this heritage."

Nunning is part of five alumnae who host an annual benefit card party in Evansville, Indiana, for the retired sisters. The event has raised over \$11,000 in four years.

Dalton says the biggest benefit from serving on the alumnae board is "giving back to the sisters." She has a simple reason for wanting to stay connected to the sisters.

"They rock!" she exclaims.

And she also has a special message for other alumnae.

"I have always felt sorry for graduates who cut themselves off. The four years at the Academy were the most formative of my life, and I would never give them back for anything.

"I just hope those girls who haven't been back will make it a point to visit. I never feel old when I visit. The school is closed, but we have the Academy in our heart. We don't need a building to remind us how important the sisters, the monastery, and other alumnae are to us. COME BACK AND VISIT!! BRING YOUR HEARTS BACK TO THE HILL!!"

# Alum nationally recognized as 'outstanding Catholic administrator'

Sister Karlene Sensmeier, class of '62, received national recognition in November when she was nominated for the Distinguished Principal Award, an honor bestowed on "outstanding Catholic administrators throughout the United States" by the National Catholic Education Association.

Sister Karlene is serving in her 28th year as principal at St. Benedict School in Evansville. During the last 10 years, enrollment at the school has doubled. The superintendent of Catholic schools in the Evansville Diocese, Daryl Hagan, attributes that growth to Sister Karlene. "Her nurturing presence, high academic expectations for students, parents, faculty, and staff, and her strong faith-filled spirit have led families to choose St. Benedict as a partner in forming their children in the faith."

Michelle Priar, assistant superintendent, said, "Her creative leadership has inspired many teachers and students throughout the years. Her long-standing commitment to Catholic education has earned her the respect of students, teachers, colleagues, and the community at large."

She is seen as an outstanding educational and community leader.

In addition to her years of ministry in school administration and teaching, Sister Karlene has served as administrator for the Institute



for Spirituality Leadership in Chicago, associate director of Development and coordinator of long-range planning for the Sisters of St. Benedict, and director of Kordes Center in Ferdinand.

#### AIC/MHA Alumnae Contributions to the Sisters of St. Benedict from January 1 to December 31, 2010

We are giving a summary of alumnae contributions in a different way from past reports. The number of alumnae for whom we have up-to-date addresses is 1,646, from 73 different classes. Of that total number of alums, 362 (22%) made contributions to the Sisters of St. Benedict in 2010, totaling \$129,029.66. Former teachers/staff contributed \$4,168 last year.

Six classes had at least half of their members who donated to the sisters in 2010.

## Alumna Writes Book on the Rosary

When Sister Madonna Helmer '55 celebrated her golden jubilee as a Sister of St. Benedict in 2006, she felt there was "something special I should do as I met that milestone in my life." What she ended up doing, even though she never considered herself a writer, was write a book!

The rosary has been an important part of her spiritual life since she was a child, she says. Her mother had a great love for Mary and the rosary, and she would gather the children together to pray the rosary when Sister Madonna's father, an Evansville fireman, responded to a call, as well as at other times.

And so Sister Madonna ended up writing A Mysterious Journey: Reflections on the Mysteries of the Rosary. In the nearly 80-page book, she offers her thoughts on the 20 joyful, luminous, sorrowful, and glorious mysteries.

She says that writing the book has been "a wonderful spiritual journey," and she invites readers to write their own reflections and see how the experience might change them.
