Putting voice to my blessings

Christ's peace must reign in your hearts, since as members of the one body you have been called to that peace. Dedicate yourselves to thankfulness. (Colossians 3:15)

I am so thankful for the multitude of MHA memories. Who knew my life's career path really began when I walked through the doors of Madonna Hall at age 13. Sisters Anna and Mary James gave me a wonderful campus tour. yet all the while, I knew I would not be attending MHA as a student. But something about their

simple reverence for all people and things changed my 13-year-old mind — yes, I would be attending. There in Ferdinand, Indiana, were the faces of God's world: students from cities and towns, near and far, local and international, all races and religions. Graciela Zelaya and Zunie Castrellon came from Panama; Martica Bacallao brought us many things Cuban via Centralia, Illinois.

Memories...

Sister Carla kept us awake in Latin I. "Get those cobwebs out of your brains," she would say. We were a scared class of six students, so we asked if perhaps we could study ONE year of Latin over TWO years. She thought it was a great idea: TWO years of Latin in ONE year! So as freshman, we studied Latin I and Latin II and prepared for the National Latin Exam. She also taught us useful things like *Ultramundanus es*, which you could say to a young man you really liked. It helped, too, if he were a student of Latin. Oh, yes, translation: "You are out of this world!" Go, Sister Carla!

Thanks to this fine little lady, I am a Spanish teacher by trade and a lover of all things language by interest. I was blessed to have her teach me four years of Latin, two of French and a month-long crash course in

> Spanish. Thank you, Sister Mary Dominic, for letting Sister Carla "get her way" in scheduling my classes.

Only four of us from MHA got to experience the work and world of the Benedictine sisters in Peru. Barb Holmes and Mary Ann Sabina got to study in Peru the summer of 1974. Marilyn Schroeder and I were chosen to study at Santa Rita's School in Morropón,

Peru, for the next summer. Because of that, Sister Carla and I attempted to decipher beginner Spanish in May of 1975.

Oh, to be 16 and navigating the Miami airport and customs! And then, Lima, Peru, in winter in the southern hemisphere. After an 18-hour bus ride from Lima northward up the coast to Morropón, with a few customs stops along the way, we arrived. In Morropón we had electricity in the evenings, thanks to the Augustinian Fathers' generator. Hot water for showers? No!

What a great bunch of sisters were there: Sisters Barbara Jean, Pat, Rosa Lee, and Mary Leah; and in the mountains, Sisters Romaine and Mary. Who knew that I could say so many incorrect things and still learn to speak an acceptable present tense Spanish with a pretty decent accent. I did so, only because the sisters and the students were such wonderful teachers and friends. Now, 40 years later, I can still sing a pretty good rendition of the Peruvian National Anthem: *Tengo orgullo*

de ser peruano y soy feliz....

In Peru, I discovered such very happy people! Even though they had next to nothing in material things, they would share their food or whatever they had with us. What simple joy was theirs. "Hasta luequito!" they would say smiling,"See you later," even though our paths would never cross again. Marilyn and I got to see Cuzco and Machu Picchu, thanks to a sweet sister from Toms River, New Jersey, who was our tour guide. We also stopped to see Graciela in Puerto Armuelles, Panama. Who knew houses didn't need

glass window panes in the tropics, just shutters to keep out the weather. The whole summer was quite an education for this 16-year-old small-town girl.

My experience in Peru led me to change my intended major at Notre Dame from French to Spanish. Sister Mary James was so kind to tutor me in Spanish the summer before I entered Notre Dame in 1976. Thanks to her, I survived and thrived in the intensive Spanish class geared for students who had taken three or four years of high school Spanish. Go, Sister Mary James! I am forever grateful.

My sophomore year of university was spent at La Universidad Anahuac, Mexico City, Mexico. I got the chance

to visit with my former MHA roommate Sonia Elizabeth Rodriguez, her little sister Nora, and their cousins. The best way to experience a country is through the eyes of the native-born people. What hospitality was shown me! *Gracias*, *familia Rodriguez!*

Upon graduation from Notre Dame in 1980 with a degree in Spanish and Latin American Studies, I had no set job and no teaching credential. All I knew was that I wanted to **use** my Spanish, not teach it. Who knew that the Civil Service exam I took that spring would reap benefits. After my interview, I was offered the job of Food and Nutrition Specialist, Department of Agriculture, in Chicago, Illinois, or Miami, Florida. All the time I was

thinking, "Aren't there any other bilingual folks in those two cities?" Since the job started in January, Miami was the obvious winner. Thanks mom and dad for driving with me to Miami and helping me get settled! In one and a half years I learned a lot of new Spanish vocabulary — food stamp language, retail vs. whole-

Meanwhile, back at MHA, Mrs. Kay Bretz had died, and Sister Mary Dominic was in need of a Spanish teacher. My name had been mentioned in a conversation with my parents. So, when I was home for Easter that year, I visited Sister Mary Dominic. She gave me a great tour of campus and all things new. I planned to turn down the teaching position if she offered it to me. I liked Miami! She mentioned that a Spanish teacher would be needed for the next school year and that I should think about it. I cried the whole flight back to Miami. Yes, I would return to MHA if Sister Mary Dominic wanted me.

My letter to her was in the mail in less than two weeks. Later, Sister Mary Philip confessed that she had her reservations about me - I was such a serious and quiet student, I might not be a good fit in her foreign language department. I couldn't have asked for a better job, nor better directors -Sister Mary Dominic as principal and Sister Mary Philip as department chair. Those two fine women fought and won for me a temporary teaching license while I was working on the necessary coursework for my license. Go, Sisters Mary Dominic and Mary Philip!

I began my teaching career at the Academy in the fall of 1982. God's world was still in Ferdinand, Indiana, just as it had been when I was a student! Farm girls, city girls, from Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Mississippi, Japan, Mexico, Panama, Hong Kong — wonderful, unique young ladies with lovely names like Kristi, Mimi, Brenda, Rie, Janet, Tanya, Amy, Megumi, Jennifer, Laura, Sarah, Ana, Carlina, Yee Yan, Mel, and Julie — were at MHA, all, for the most part, willing to learn and open to the spirit of the Benedictine sisters in that global community.

No, I never wanted to teach, but YES, I wanted to teach at Marian Heights Academy! We could begin each class with a prayer; we could talk about God and our faith. And so I say many thanks to you lovely young ladies who shared your dreams, your culture, your faith, your laughter, your tears. I hope I taught you some

Spanish and English, but, more importantly, taught you to believe in yourself and always trust in God. You have become beautiful young women. You continue to inspire me!

As I look back on these many years, I know God's world is still on the hill at Monastery Immaculate Conception with the Benedictine sisters. For those of us who have experienced AIC/MHA as students or teachers or visitors, we know that God's world is ever present right before our eyes — we only must look. God has blessed my life with such incredible opportunities and will continue to do so — I only must look.

I am truly thankful to the sisters who have touched my life as teachers, mentors, coworkers, and friends. I believe that in those times in my life when I was thinking "no," the sisters were praying for my "yes." I know God listens to their prayers; I have no

doubt! Thank you, sisters, for your prayerfulness, for sharing your home, and for allowing me and my best friend Tom to marry in your chapel that fine summer day. Thank you for sharing Christ's peace with all who enter your door!

Ferdinand is celebrating its 175th birthday this year

In observance of its 175th anniversary, the town of Ferdinand has scheduled events throughout the year, culminating with a festival during the week of June 14-21, with a grand parade on Sunday, June 21.

The sisters will participate in the 175th observances in various ways. They will offer a special invitation to the Ferdinand people to an "afternoon with the sisters" on Sunday, May 3, for various activities, refreshments, and a powerpoint presentation featuring the monastery's connection with the town for the past 148 years — since 1867 when four pioneer sisters from the Benedictine monastery in Covington, Kentucky, came to Ferdinand to teach the German settlers and to establish a Benedictine foundation, which eventually became Monastery Immaculate Conception. The sisters will also have a booth (homemade ice cream sandwiches) at the festival in June and will have a float in the grand parade on June 21.

News from the hill

Monastery receives new member

On January 11, the sisters officially accepted Lynn Falcony into the postulancy, the first stage of incorporation into the Benedictine community.

Lynn is from Evansville and most recently had worked as an IV Pharmacy Tech at St. Mary's Medical Center in Evansville.

She lived in the sister's Evansville discernment house for six weeks prior to moving to the monastery in Ferdinand.

Lynn learned about the sisters after she became a member of Saint Anthony Parish in Evansville. She said, "Upon joining my new parish, I was looking for a way to get involved. I began volunteering with the high school youth group and was introduced to the Sisters of St. Benedict through Sister Teresa Gunter (Sister T), the youth minister at the parish (and former MHA faculty member). After working with Sister T and being introduced to and welcomed by the community, I chose to continue to explore my options. During my time of discernment, I learned a lot about myself and my faith and look forward to learning more and experiencing Benedictine monastic life with these amazing women."

Bringing new life to "old" buildings

During the past few years the sisters have been studying, discussing, and assessing how they might "right size" the buildings on campus to use for ministry and for the monastery. They focused their efforts on three structures that have been underused or vacant — Benet Hall, MHA gymnasium, and Academy Art Studio.

As a result of their planning and work, the sisters are bringing changes and new activities to the campus. On January 31, they officially opened the Monastery Event Hall, located in the former MHA gymnasium. After a modest "makeover," this facility is now available for the public to rent for events such as family reunions, weddings, anniversary celebrations, holiday parties, and other gatherings. The monastery gift shop, For Heaven's Sake, was moved

from Benet Hall to a renovated section of the MHA gymnasium in October. In January the shop held its grand reopening in this new location, the same building as Monastery Event Hall.

The Art Building has been leased to two local entrepreneurs who plan to establish a microbrewery in the building. They are waiting to obtain approval for the license to operate a brewery with a tasting room and bottled specialty craft beers. In the meantime, they are moving equipment and other items into the building and hope to open St. Benedict's Brew Works in May.

Last November the sisters gave their official approval to proceed with plans for the use of Benet Hall. Their intent is to convert Benet Hall into a facility that offers affordable housing for seniors. The building would be reconstructed into 15 two-bedroom/two-bathroom apartments. A market study determined there is an obvious need in the area for additional affordable housing. After much deliberation, consultation, cooperation with the town, legal steps, etc., the sisters submitted their application for this project to the Indiana Housing & Community Development Authority in November.

The IHCDA received 52 applications for rental housing tax-credit projects and estimated that 14 would be approved. If the sisters' application is approved for affordable rental housing for seniors, the project would qualify for tax credits and related funding. By late February they expect to hear a decision.

Regardless of the outcome of the Benet Hall proposal, the sisters will continue to dream and work toward new endeavors on the hill.

On behalf of the Sisters of St. Benedict of Ferdinand, I express our heartfelt gratitude to all the student alumnae and former staff members who have so generously contributed financially to our community and our ministries in the past year. Your donations increased from last year by \$51,364.22

In our Mission Advancement database, we have current addresses for 1604 Academy alumnae, including 123 former staff members. Of that total number, 311 (19%) contributed \$160,289.20 to the Sisters of St. Benedict in 2014.

Here is a summary of the top contributions by classes and by percentage of donors in each class from January 1 through December 31, 2014.
