Update on use of buildings on campus

The sisters' **Benet Hall project** is moving along faster than anticipated. This past February, their application for tax credits for converting Benet Hall into affordable housing for seniors was approved. Since then, the project has been on a fast track. Sister Barbara Lynn, prioress of the Sisters of St. Benedict, and other sisters on the administrative council, along with Alan Hoffman, chief operating officer for the sisters, have been working with developers, marketing surveyors, financial consultants, investors, architects, designers, engineers, apartment managers, and many more experts in planning and implementing this project.

Since May, there have been many meetings to create the design for the facility. The building will be reconstructed into 15 senior housing apartments. It's expected potential contractors will be given detailed prints by September/October. Once the contractor is selected, construction is scheduled to begin later this year, with completion in October 2016 — earlier than the original estimate. "Thanks to the project having solid financial support, we received favorable loan terms that enabled us to start the process sooner," said Sister Barbara Lynn.

Persons interested in renting an apartment can get their names on a list by contacting Ginny Van Kirk at 812-367-1411, ext. 2650, or at gvankirk@thedome.org. Valenti, the organization that will manage the apartments, will process applicants to insure compliance with all eligibility requirements.

The **Monastery Event Hall**, located in the former MHA gymnasium, has been available for rental since February. Recently, with inquiries and rentals increasing, more is being done to enhance the kitchenette area, which will include a stove, refrigerator, and sink. At least eight weekends have been booked from August to December. Events include weddings, family gatherings, parties, spiritual enrichment and educational programs, etc.

Alums experienced the comfortable and attractive space of the hall during their reunion weekend in June. "The room and decorations were lovely and an enjoyable place to visit our classmates," commented one of the alums. St. Benedict's Brew Works, a microbrewery located in the former Academy Art Studio building leased by the sisters, will hold its grand opening on Saturday, October 10. The brewery owners, two local entrepreneurs, received state and federal licenses earlier this summer to operate a brewery. With that approval, they began setting up equipment and preparing the inside of the building. Also, new siding was put on the exterior. Now the brewers are brewing their specialty craft beers, and the former Art Studio is again in use. Alumnae are invited to patronize the brewery and taste the specialty beers (without watching out for a proctor).

St. Ferdinand Parish uses monastery church

While the St. Ferdinand parish church is undergoing renovation for the next few months, any previously scheduled weddings at the parish have been or will be taking place in the monastery church. The parish church renovation is expected to be completed sometime in January.
